Improving Ropley Footpaths – Progress Report August 2023

Introduction

The rights of way in Ropley provide community links from the multiple hubs of the village to the village centre, where there is a primary school, shop, church, parish hall, and recreation ground with sports facilities. They also form big circular routes that are popular with trail users from all over the area. Part of St. Swithun's Way goes through Ropley.

Ropley's footpath network has a large number of stiles, which means that access for people with limited mobility is constrained. Ropley Parish Council is keen to improve access to the footpath network by replacing stiles with kissing gates and gates. The aims of the project are to:

- 1. Improve access to footpaths that provide safe walking links between the village centre and outlying clusters of housing in Ropley (for example, Soames Lane, Ropley Dean, Gilbert Street) described as 'priority routes'.
- 2. Improve access to circular walks, providing a positive impact on physical and mental health.

Using volunteers

A group of volunteers has been established to help install the kissing gates so that we can buy more gates with the funds available. This is fairly heavy work, as it includes digging holes for new posts. Coffee and cake is provided! The Ropley Footpath Improvement Team (RFIT) currently has 12 members. New kissing gates installed

Two kissing gates have been installed in 2023: one on footpath 4 at the junction with Gascoigne Lane, and a second one on footpath 29, where it enters the woods, see above.

Plans are at an advanced stage for installing quite a few more kissing gates over the next few months, including on footpaths 24, 28, 30, and 38.

We are grateful to the landowners for their support with the project.

Funding

The project is being funded by contributions from Hampshire Council, Ropley Parish Council, Ropley Society, our county councillor and district councillor, and local residents.

The project is divided into two phases, which are listed below. For the purposes of this report, we have assumed that the costs of materials for one kissing gate (gate and post-crete) are approximately £1,000.

Phase 1

Currently we have sufficient funding to install 14 kissing gates. Additional funding is required to install three further gates.

The volume of work means that we are seeking the support of other volunteer groups, for example the Alton Ramblers, to install some of the gates.

Phase 2

Hampshire Countryside Service

As mentioned previously Hampshire County Council are part funding this work. In addition, where access to the stile/gate is challenging due to steep slopes, the Hampshire Countryside Service team have agreed to improve access through the use of ramps and steps where new kissing gates are installed. One example will be for the new kissing gate on FP29.
